PROJECT AT MUZZIO PARK

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommend that the Parks and Recreation Commission approve the Youth Art Mosaics Project to be placed at Muzzio Park Community Center, located at 26 W Front Street.

BACKGROUND:

Community Arts & Empowerment has occupied the Muzzio Mosaic Art Center (Muzzio Park Community Center) at Muzzio Park for the past six years, with a mission to make public art for, by, and with the community. In October of 2024 Community Arts & Empowerment completed Watsonville Brilliante, a monumental 5-year mosaic art project that covers the Civic Parking Garage located at 275 Main Street. All mosaics for this project were fabricated at the Muzzio Mosaic Art Center, and 80% of the work was done by local youth. Community Arts & Empowerment have now received a grant from the California Arts Council to continue creating mosaics at the Muzzio Mosaic Art Center located at 26 W Front Street. Community Arts & Empowerment is also currently working on other City public art projects, including art for the City Plaza Revitalization Project and the Nature Center.

DISCUSSION:

Design Selection Process

Page 1 of 5

The Youth Art Mosaics Project will consist of 200 ft of mosaics applied to the community center at Muzzio Park. Outreach to local high school art teachers began in December 2024 and 120 local students submitted mosaics designs for this project. A neighborhood artist along with Community Arts & Empowerment staff chose eight designs to put forward for voting in the community surrounding Muzzio Park. Door-to-door outreach was conducted in the neighborhood, which consisted of bilingual students, to ask residents which images they preferred. A total of seventy-eight (78) households voted and four images were chosen to represent the residents in this neighborhood.

<u>Fabrication & Installation</u>

The project's main component will consist of six-inch mosaics borders surrounding the windows and two main doors of the Muzzio Mosaic Arts Center. Additionally, three mosaics measuring 4 ft by 8 ft will be installed in frames and hung on the outside of the building. The mosaics will be fabricated in the Muzzio Mosaic Art Center, primarily by youth. Mosaic installation will be completed by Kathleen Crocetti and Susanne Brubeck with assistance from youth. The three 4x8 mosaics will weigh approximately 120 lb. each and will be installed using metal frames that will attach to the building using a Z clip system. This framing method was engineered by Andrew Radovan for a project in the City of Santa Cruz to attach Z clips to the frame. The artwork is slipped into the Z clips attached to the wall with an additional bolt and small clip at the top of the artwork for safety purposes and to prevent theft. Finally, the mosaic border will be applied directly to the building.

My artwork reflects the people in the community with its representation of hard-working farmers who contribute and bring benefit to the community. Overall, our community is filled with hard-working people from different areas around the world, and it is crucial to acknowledge everyone for the development and inclusivity of our community.

Lizbeth Martínez-Meza Watsonville High School



My artwork fits the theme "People of The Neighborhood" because it has vibrant colors and many designs that represent their culture. For example, paper bunting "papel picado" and the monarch butterflies. This artwork represents the future of the children. In the center of the drawing, there's a girl proudly wearing a graduation gown. She has a smile on her face which symbolizes her academic achievements. Besides her are her parents. Their faces are filled with pride and happiness, their eyes are sparkling as they admire their daughter.

Janet Rocha-Fernandez Watsonville Highschool



My artwork fits the theme "people of the neighborhood" because it depicts the relationship between a mother and daughter and the community workers. This interaction is small and passing but echoes parents' closeness with their children, especially during difficult times that require sacrifice. I truly believe the people at my park will like my piece because we've all experienced it—if not seen it. I hope you select my design because this is my first experience depicting something so prominent and meaningful in my childhood. I'd want people to see this mosaic and come to the same realization I have, that this moment is worth capturing.

Maintenance Plan

The mosaics will be made from tile and glass using modern cementitious products for installation. The mosaics will likely outlast the life of the building. They will be sealed, and resealing will not be needed for 5-7 years. Resealing will be done by Community Arts & Empowerment if we are still occupying the building.

Community Engagement

In addition to the 120 high school artists who have already participated by submitting designs,

the mosaics will be fabricated in the Muzzio Mosaic Arts Center. The Center is open to teens from 3:30-7:30pm Monday-Thursday and Sundays to the community at large to create mosaics. Eight

(8) paid youth interns will oversee the community volunteers' work.

The limits of insurance applicable to the public entity and applicable individuals identified as an additional insured(s) pursuant to Provision A.4. above, are those specified in the written contract between you and that public entity, or the limits available under this policy, whichever are less. These limits are part of and not in addition to the limits of insurance under this policy.
- C. With respect to the insurance provided to the additional insured(s), Condition 4. Other Insurance of SECTION IV COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY CONDITIONS is replaced by the following:

4. Other Insurance

a. Primary Insurance

This insurance is primary if you have agreed in a written contract or written agreement:

(1) That this insurance be primary. If other insurance is also primary, we will share with all that other insurance as described in **c**. below; or

Background

Community Arts & Empowerment was formed to make art for, by and with the public, to build community identity, pride and connections through public art projects, and foster creativity and empower communities through the arts.





Previous Youth Project:

The artwork on the left was done by Caitlin Bayaca who was a Junior at Aptos High School. We paid her for her artwork, and then we hired her to help make the mosaics.

The final mosaic will be on this building for as long as the building stands, potentially hundreds of years.

Caitlyn was able to use this experience on her resume and in her college application essay letters. She was accepted into the art department at UC San Diego.

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Discussion

Current Project Introduction:

Through a grant from the the California Arts Council we will be creating mosaics for the Muzzio Mosaic Arts Center.

We sought proposals from youth artists or youth artist teams to create a vibrant and visually engaging designs to be translated into mosaics for the walls of the Muzzio Mosaic Arts Center located in Muzzio Park, 26 West Front St. This project aims to enhance the aesthetic appeal of the area, contribute to placemaking efforts, and celebrate the unique character of Watsonville



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Design Selection Process

Project Design:


- The theme for the art was
 "People of the Neighborhood"
- 2. Designs from four High School artists were selected from 120 entries.
- 3. 78 households were surveyed to choose the designs.



Neighborhood Highlights

Things to know about the neighbors of Muzzio Park:

- The neighborhood is high-density housing (apartments, and trailer homes)
- Most of the residents are from Mexico
- Spanish is the primary language in most households
- multigenerational living is common in the neighborhood
- It is common for working adults to have 2-to 3 jobs in agriculture and service industries



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Muzzio Park Highlights

Things to know about Muzzio Park

- Community Garden
- The Park is an extension of people's homes Families eat meals in the park
- Grandparents and older siblings watch younger children in the park
- A youth soccer league practices in the park
- Every Sunday a basketball league consisting of Indigenous people holds games in the park
- Families walk their dogs in the park
- There is a neighborhood garden in the park
- The community center in the park is where all of the public art mosaics in Watsonville have been created by local teenagers
- Five days a week kids in the neighborhood can stop by the center to get a free snack, usually a popsicle



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Youth Artist Selection Process

Selection Criteria

The 120 Proposals were evaluated based on the following criteria:

- Artistic Excellence: Creativity, originality, and aesthetic quality of the proposed mural design.
- Relevance: Alignment with the project scope and ability to resonate with the community and character of downtown Watsonville
- Feasibility: Practicality of the proposed design in terms of scale and translation into mosaics

CA&E staff and a neighborhood artist selected 8 images for the community to vote on



Youth Artist Design Selected #1

Viridiana Bonilla-Zamudio Aptos High School

My artwork fits the theme "people of the neighborhood" because it depicts the relationship between a mother and daughter and the community workers. This interaction is small and passing but echoes parents' closeness with their children, especially during difficult times that require sacrifice. Material Specs



The frames will be made either of stainless steel or powder coated. The framed mosaics would weight approximately 100 pounds each. The framing/hanging system has been designed by a civil engineer for a previous project.

Installation & Maintenance

Installation

Mosaics framing the windows and the doors would be directly adhered to the surface of the building. They will be 6" across, and appear a bit larger in these images than they will be in actuality. They will be made from landfill diverted tiles. The three vignettes will each measure 4' x 8' and will each be mounted in frames so that if the future they could be moved if necessary.

Maintenance

The Muzzio is a prefab building. The mosaics will likely outlast the lifetime of the building. The window and door frame osiacs would be sacrifice with the building, the 3 vignettes could be saved.



Fabrication & Community Engagement

Compensation for youth artists:

- 1. Each of the 4 artists or will each receive a \$500 stipend.
- 2. Youth artists may choose to become paid interns for CA&E to assist in the fabrication of the mosaics.
- 3. Community engagement opportunity

- Per designer input, the tensile component of the strength-level earthquake force applied to anchors does not exceed 20 percent of the total factored anchor tensile force associated with the same load combination.
