11.A. TRAFFIC SAFETY ACTION PLAN

1) Staff Report

The report was given by City Manager Huffaker, Deputy City Manager Vides, Police Chief Honda, Police Captain David Rodriguez, Assistant Public Works & Utilities Director Rodriguez, and Public Works & Utilities Director Palmisano.

2) City Council Questions

Police Captain Rodriguez and Deputy City Manager Vides answered questions from Member Hernandez regarding efforts to educate the public about safety. Member Hernandez recommended implementation of a scholarship program for youth who participate in creation of public safety videos. Member Hernandez gave several recommendations on how to improve pedestrian and bike safety.

Assistant Public Works & Utilities Director Rodriguez and Police Chief Honda answered questions from Member Parker regarding potential for reduction of speed limits, increasing streetlight brightness, statistics regarding accidents, and enforcement efforts.

Assistant Public Works & Utilities Director Rodriguez, Police Chief Honda, and Public Works & Utilities Director Palmisano answered questions from Member Garcia regarding process for implementing Vision Zero and ways Council could help through legislation.

Assistant Public Works & Utilities Director Rodriguez answered questions from Member Coffman-Gomez regarding restrictions in changing speed limits. Member Coffman-Gomez asked staff to work with Caltrans to improve Main Street, improve lighting citywide, collaborate with other agencies, expedite neighborhood traffic group creation, explore increase of fines in hotspots, explore implementation of speed cameras, and maximize quality of flashing beacons at crosswalks.

Member Gonzalez asked staff to explore double lines at crosswalks, place red cones temporarily at dangerous areas to warn residents, explore median improvements, and pursue the handheld flag program at intersections.

3) Public Input

Steve Trujillo commended Police for enforcing speed laws. He listed several ways the City could improve pedestrian and bike safety.

Dan Hernandez commended staff on their recommendations and stressed the importance of the proposed safety ad hoc committee.

Kirby Harris, Bridge Street, spoke about excessive speeding and lack of proper striping on her street. She gave recommendations on how to improve the area.

Yanika Straus, Director of Bike Santa Cruz County, spoke in support of the traffic safety plan and gave suggestions on how to further improve the plan. She invited the Council and public to the Light up the Night Bike Ride.

Jenni Veitch-Olson encouraged the Council to approve staff recommendation. She asked Council to pursue lowering of speed limits.

Pat Fohrman listed several ways the City could improve pedestrian and bike safety.

Drew Rodgers listed several ways the City could improve pedestrian and bike safety.

?male asked City staff to concentrate safety efforts on routes to schools.

4) City Council Discussion

Member Coffman-Gomez asked staff to add a link to the Police application that guides residents on how to place their phone on do not disturb while driving.

Member Hernandez asked staff to pursue protected bike lanes as opposed to green bike lanes. He spoke about Senate Bill 127 that addresses potential reduction of speed limits.

- **MOTION**: It was moved by Member Coffman-Gomez, seconded by Member Hernandez and carried by the following vote to authorizing the City Manager to take the following actions aimed at improving overall pedestrian and traffic safety in the City of Watsonville:

 - c) Direct the Police Department to develop a zero tolerance approach for speeding along areas designated as Pedestrian Safety Zones
 - d) Encourage the Mayor to appoint two members to an ad-hoc committee on Traffic Safety
 - e) Direct staff to work with state legislators to pursue legislation to allow City to reduce traffic speeds along high risk corridors
 - f) Explore new approaches to infrastructure enhancements, including speed cameras, sidewalk decals and pedestrian crosswalk flags

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution:

1) Accepting the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) FY2017 Pre-

Disaster Mitigation Competitive Grant in the amount of \$150,000, and

2) Authorizing the City Manager to execute all associated documents and agreements.

DISCUSSION:

Background. In 1988 Congress enacted the Stafford Act which amended the Federal Disaster Relief Act of 1974. The Stafford Act established the need for Disaster Preparedness and Mitigation Assistance, and established a fund to assist states in preparing pre-disaster mitigation plans.

The Act establishes and details the preparation of a community's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) and establishes regulations that require communities to have a current and approved plan to be eligible for Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM) project grant funding. An example of a project that would be eligible for a PDM grant is a river levee strengthening project.

Successful Grant Award. Periodically the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provides funding to the State to pass through to cities and counties to fund preparation of a LHMP. In 2017 staff applied for a PDM planning grant to prepare such a plan. Recently, City staff learned its application was successful in securing \$150,000 of PDM grant money to prepare a Local Hazard Mitigation Plan under the FY2017 Predisaster Mitigation Competitive Grant Program.

Local Hazard Mitigation Plan. A Local Hazard Mitigation Plan allows a community to identify risks and vulnerabilities associated with natural and other disasters, and

develop long-term strategies for protecting people and property from future hazard events. Developing hazard mitigation plans enables local governments to:

- Increase education and awareness around threats, hazards, and vulnerabilities;
- Build partnerships for risk reduction involving government, organizations, businesses, and the public;
- Identify long-term, broadly-supported strategies for risk reduction;
- Align risk reduction with other state and community objectives;
- Identify implementation approaches that focus resources on the greatest risks and vulnerabilities; and
- Communicate priorities to apply for and secure potential sources of funding.

Moreover, a FEMA-approved hazard mitigation plan is a condition for receiving PDM grants, including funding for mitigation projects. Ultimately, hazard mitigation planning enables implementation of projects and programs to reduce loss of life and property, lessening the impact of disasters.

The grant will be used to contract with a consultant experienced with preparing LHMP for communities. LHMP preparation will also involve assembling a technical committee of key City staff from Public Safety (Fire and Police), Public Works and Utilities, and Community Development. The committee will also include staff from nearby mutual aid agencies such as Cal Fire and appropriate staff from Santa Cruz County as well as other technical advisors, who are local experts in subject matters related to the hazards which may affect Watsonville.

The preparation of the LHMP will include broad public noticing and public scoping meetings. The technical committee will work to identify natural and other hazards to which Watsonville is vulnerable and will assess the risk. The committee will develop mitigation strategies and develop priorities, goals and an action plan to implement these strategies.

The draft plan is subject to review by Cal OES and FEMA and, once endorsed by those agencies, will be presented to the City Council for its consideration. The schedule calls for the plan to be completed in March 2021, which is the grant deadline for completion.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The total project cost for developing a new Local Hazard Mitigation Plan is estimated to be \$150,000. The PDM planning grant will provide \$112,500 in funding to the City, and requires a local match of 25%, or \$37,500. The local match will be met with \$20,000 worth of in-kind staff labor expenses, and approximately \$17,500 will be paid from the current Engineering and Administration operating budget towards this project. No additional appropriation is necessary.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This project is consistent with Goal 3, Infrastructure and Environment, Section D: Long-Range Capital Improvement Plan; and Goal 5, Community Engagement and Well-

Being, Section A: An Engaged and Informed Community.

ALTERNATIVES:

Council could choose to not accept this grant.

Amends Ordinance No. 506-80 (CM)

WHEREAS, in 2016, the City Council adopted the 2015-2023 Housing Element (Resolution No. 35-16), which includes Goal 1.0 to "improve, conserve and preserve both the safe condition and the continued availability of Watsonville's existing affordable housing stock in order to meet the needs of all economic segments of the community", as well as Policy 1.5 to "preserve the existing stock of affordable housing, including mobile homes, through City regulations and land use and development controls, including mobile home park exclusive-use zoning, as well as financial and other forms of assistance," and Five-Year Objective Number 4 to "help preserve the continued availability and affordability of the current affordable housing stock located in the City's mobile home parks" and "enact mobile home exclusive use zoning"; and

WHEREAS, Watsonville is a rapidly growing community, and it is important to ensure that the housing needs of all persons can be addressed, including residents of mobile homes; and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Administrator initiated amending the zoning ordinance in accordance with the following Goal 1.0, Policy 1.5 and Five-Year Objective No. 4 of the City's adopted Housing Element; and

WHEREAS, on or about November 6, 2018, the Planning Commission of the City of Watsonville adopted Resolution No. 11-18 (PC), recommending to the City

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Council adoption of an ordinance amending Title 14 (Zoning) of the Watsonville Municipal Code for the addition of R-MH Residential Manufactured Home Park District, establishing a mobile home park exclusive use overlay district applicable to existing mobile home parks located within the City; amending Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks), clarifying regulatory controls over mobile home parks; and amending Section 11-2.03 (Eligibility) of Chapter 2 (Mobile Homes on Single-Family Residential Lots) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks), clarifying objective design review standards for a mobile home located on a single-family residential lot; and

Chapter 14-16 (District Regulations) of Title 14 (Zoning) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding a new Part 7: R-MH-Residential Manufactured Home Park District to read in words and figures as follows:

CHAPTER 14-16 DISTRICT REGULATIONS

Part 7: R-MH Residential Manufactured Home Park District

Sec. 14-16.700 Purpose.

The R-MH Overlay District is intended to implement Policy 1.5 of Watsonville's

2015 – 2023 Housing Element of adopting "mobile home park exclusive use zoning" as a method to "preserve the existing stock of affordable housing, including mobile home parks through City regulations and land use and development controls" and Goal 1.0 to "improve, conserve and preserve both the safe condition and the continued availability of Watsonville's existing affordable housing stock in order to meet the needs of all economic segments of the community." It is also intended to meet the Housing Element's Five-Year Objective No. 4 to "enact mobile home exclusive use zoning" in order to "preserve the continued availability and affordability of the current affordable housing stock located in the city's mobile home parks."

Sec. 14-16.701 Permitted uses.

The following uses are permitted in the R-MH Overlay District with approval of an Administrative Review Permit:

- (a) Mobile home park or manufactured home park.
- (b) Small family day care homes.
- (c) Parks, trails, open spaces and other recreational uses.

Sec. 14-16.702 Conditionally permitted uses.

The following uses may be permitted in the R-MH Overlay District subject to approval of a Special Use Permit:

- (a) Churches
- (b) Wireless communication facilities
- (c) Cemeteries
- (d) Child day care centers
- (e) Schools

- (f) Neighborhood community centers
- (g) Emergency communication towers
- (h) Group foster homes
- (i) Bed-and-breakfast establishments
- (j) Farm employee housing.

Sec. 14-16.703 Special exception uses.

The City Council may approve the property owner's request for a use exception if the property owner demonstrates either of the following:

- (a) That they do not have reasonable use of their property under the R-MH zoning.
- (b) That the uses authorized by the R-MH zoning are not economically viable at the property's location.

Sec. 14-16.704 Prohibited uses.

(a) Any use not specifically authorized.

Sec. 14-16.705 Property development standards.

Mobile homes and mobile home parks shall conform to the property development standards set forth in Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks). Mobile homes on single-family residential lots shall conform to the property development standards set forth in Chapter 2 (Mobile Homes on Single-Family Residential Lots) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks). A Design Review Permit shall be required for any new development in the R-MH Overlay District. A Minor Design Review Permit shall be required for any remodels or

additions to existing facilities so long as the existing density is not increased or the number of mobile home spaces reduced.

SECTION 2. PUBLICATION.

This ordinance shall be published in the Watsonville Register Pajaronina and/or\
Santa Cruz Sentinel in compliance with the provisions of the Charter of the City of Watsonville.

SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall be in force and take effect thirty (30) days after its final adoption.

CHAPTER 1 LOCAL STANDARDS AND REGULATIONS FOR MOBILE HOMES AND PARKS

Subsection (a) of Section 11-1.04 (Locational standards) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.04 Locational standards.

(a) Mobile home parks may be permitted within residential areas designated on the General Plan for medium densities of eight (8) to fourteen (14) dwelling units per net acre. Densities from outside the project site area shall not be transferable to a project site area. Project site area is defined as the area or single leasehold interest that is used or usable by residents of the park.

Section 11-1.07 (Utilities) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.07 Utilities.

- (a) All utilities shall be installed underground except equipment appurtenant to underground facilities, such as surface-mounted transformers and meter cabinets. The developer shall be responsible for complying with the requirements of this section and shall make the necessary arrangements with the utility companies involved for the installations of such facilities.
- (b) Each mobile home space shall contain a utility island containing the sewer, water, and utility connections. Said island, together with a typical mobile home pad, shall be depicted in an enlarged plot plan.

Section 11-1.08 (Parking) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.08 Parking.

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- (a) Street widths shall be of sufficient width as required by City regulations and the technical regulations to allow the parking of automobiles on one street side within all mobile home parks; provided, however, there shall be two (2) off-street parking spaces for every mobile home lot.
- (b) A minimum of one (1) parking space shall be provided immediately adjacent to the mobile home. Visitor parking may be developed in conjunction with a

common area or community facility or dispersed in small clusters throughout the circulation pattern if screened properly from resident mobile home spaces.

Section 11-1.09 of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding a new Subsection (e) to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.09 Streets.

(b) All interior streets shall be designated according to the technical regulations and shall be of sufficient radius of turn and grade of slope to allow safe travel at speeds required for the specific street. Internal streets shall have a minimum width of at least twenty (20) feet, curb to curb, with no parking allowed. Internal streets with one (1) side devoted to parallel parking shall be a minimum of thirty (30) feet wide and thirty-six (36) feet wide if parking is designed for both sides.

(e) When a mobile home park abuts a public street a planted strip having an average width of ten (10) feet shall be provided adjacent to said street.

Section 11-1.10 (Access) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.10 Access.

(a) All mobile home spaces shall be served from internal private streets within the mobile home park, and there shall be no direct vehicular access from a mobile home

space to a public street or alley. Internal streets shall have a clear and unobstructed access to a public street.

- (b) A secondary emergency exit shall be provided and properly signed.
- (c) A network of lighted pedestrian walkways adequate for wheelchair use shall be provided leading to common recreational areas, service facilities, and circulation among the residential areas whenever possible.

Section 11-1.11 (Boat and recreational vehicle storage) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.11 Boat and recreational vehicle storage.

All boats, recreational vehicles, park maintenance vehicles and equipment, and similar large items shall be stored in an area set aside for such storage only and shall be screened from view. Such storage shall not be allowed on any street or individual mobile home lot.

Section 11-1.12 (Landscaping and aesthetics) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended by amending title and adding new Subsections (e), (f) and (g) to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.12 Landscaping, aesthetics and open space.

(e) For each mobile home lot, there shall be provided a minimum of two hundred (200) square feet of usable common area.

(f) In addition to the usable common area, a community recreation center with a floor area of twenty (20) square feet per mobile home may be applied to mobile home parks having twenty (20) mobile homes or more. Space devoted to administrative office, laundry, or non-recreational uses may be developed in conjunction with a community center.

(g) Sections of mobile home parks devoted to families and those areas devoted to adults shall be clearly identified. Adequate recreational areas and facilities shall be provided to suit the needs of each said group, and a bus stop may be required.

Section 11-1.14 (Sewage disposal) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.14 Sewage disposal.

The utilization of sanitary sewer facilities shall be provided as required by the provisions of Article 5 (Sewer Services) of Chapter 3 (City Utilities) of Title 6 (Sanitation and Health) of this Code.

Section 11-1.15 (Garbage and rubbish disposal) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.15 Garbage and rubbish disposal.

(a) Mobile home park owners shall be required to use the Waste Disposal System of the City as provided by Chapter 3 (City Utilities) of Title 6 (Sanitation and

Health) of this Code and shall provide disposal facilities in accordance with the technical regulations.

(b) There shall be adequate areas within the mobile home park for refuse storage. Such refuse storage areas shall be screened by a six (6) foot solid fence, or by optional screening as approved by the Community Development Director.

Section 11-1.16 (Water supply) of Chapter 1 (Local Standards and Regulations for Mobile Homes and Parks) of Title 11 (Mobile Homes and Parks) of the Watsonville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in words and figures as follows:

Sec. 11-1.16 Water supply.

Each mobile home park shall connect to and be serviced by the Water

Department in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3 (City Utilities) of Title 6

(Sanitation and Health) of this Code and with the requirements of the Public Works

Department.

WHEREAS, in 2016, the City Council adopted the 2015-2023 Housing Element (Resolution No. 35-16), which includes Goal 1.0 to "improve, conserve and preserve both the safe condition and the continued availability of Watsonville's existing affordable housing stock in order to meet the needs of all economic segments of the community", as well as Policy 1.5 to "preserve the existing stock of affordable housing, including mobile homes, through City regulations and land use and development controls, including mobile home park exclusive-use zoning, as well as financial and other forms of assistance," and Five-Year Objective Number 4 to "help preserve the continued availability and affordability of the current affordable housing stock located in the City's mobile home parks" and "enact mobile home exclusive use zoning"; and

WHEREAS, Watsonville is a rapidly growing community, and it is important to ensure that the housing needs of all persons can be addressed, including residents of mobile homes; and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Administrator initiated amending the zoning ordinance in accordance with the following Goal 1.0, Policy 1.5 and Five-Year Objective No. 4 of the City's adopted Housing Element; and

WHEREAS, on or about November 6, 2018, the Planning Commission of the City of Watsonville adopted Resolution No. 11-18 (PC), recommending to the City Council adoption of an ordinance amending Title 14 (Zoning) of the Watsonville Municipal Code for the addition of R-MH Residential Manufactured Home Park District,

WHEREAS, notice of time and place of hearing for approval to establish the R-MH Residential Manufactured Home Park District, a mobile home park exclusive-use overlay district was given at the time and in the manner prescribed by the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Watsonville (Watsonville Municipal Code 14-10.900.); and

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WHEREAS, having made Findings which are attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "A," by adoption of this ordinance the criteria for approval set forth in Section 14-12.807 of the Watsonville Municipal Code are satisfied; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered all evidence received, both oral and documentary, and the matter was submitted for decision.



Staff recommends that the City Council adopt a motion directing staff to proceed with the *Watsonville Brillante Project* at the Rodriguez Street Parking Garage and prepare a lease for the Muzzio Park Community Center for 5 years at a \$1.00 per year as described in this staff report;

If the Council adopts the motion directing staff to proceed, staff then recommends that the City Council by resolution:

- 1. Appropriate \$60,000 from the 150 General Fund as per CIP Budget for FY 2018/2019 to pay a third party contractor to prepare the exterior concrete surface of the parking garage for installation of the mosaic mural
- 2. Approve in-kind contributions requested by the artist in support of this Project
- 3. Waive City building permit fees for the Project estimated at \$10,500

And the Council by motion

4. Authorize and direct the City Manager to negotiate and execute all necessary agreements. The lease will however come back to the Council for approval.

DISCUSSION:

Background

In 2017, local artist Kathleen Crocetti designed and installed sidewalk mosaic medallions on Main Street, titled "Celebrating the Diversity of Labor."

In the spring of 2018, the City received a proposal from Ms. Crocetti, for a project titled *Watsonville Brillante*. The stated mission of *Watsonville Brillante* is to "Build community through creative place making" by transforming the exterior of the Rodriguez Street

Parking Garage into "a landmark artwork, while empowering and employing the youth of Watsonville."

On September 25, 2018, Kathleen Crocetti provided a presentation to the Council outlining her initial proposal for this Project. Since then, staff has met with Ms. Crocetti to discuss Project details, including resources needed to execute the Project, costs to the City and project maintenance.

The Proposed Project

The goal of *Watsonville Brillante* is "to transform our community through creative place-making, while empowering and employing the youth of Watsonville."

The concept of this Project is that over a period of 5 years, the Rodriguez Street Parking Garage in downtown Watsonville would be covered with mosaics creating a monumental artwork with the theme of "Vibrancy, Diversity and Connectedness in Watsonville." Per Ms. Crocetti's proposal, the Project's outcomes include the transformation of "one of our downtown civic buildings into a landmark artwork. This work will be completed in a free, open art space for teens and community members to come make art and to transform our community and ourselves together."

This art space would be free to attend and focus on generating creativity and investing in underserved youth. Open after school during the school year and on the weekends, this space would be used to create the tile mosaics that would be adhered to the garage upon completion. This space would create a safe after school opportunity where young people could develop artistic skills and experience, while participating in enriching and pro-social activities. Youth will also gain tile trade and administration skills that could translate into employment and potentially earn high school credits that could be used towards graduation.

According to Ms. Crocetti, "the sidewalk mosaics, 'Celebrating the Diversity of Labor' are representative of our early immigrant history, but they do not capture who we are today, nor how we are all connected to each other. Rarely, does one family group identify with only one culture; most of us have mixed heritages. Our mixed heritages are one of the things that connect us. The garage has one hundred and eighty-five 8' x 3.5' horizontal sections. Each section would represent one of the 185 different family groups. These family groups would be arranged in such a way that overlapping cultures would be beside each other tying the families and the designs together".

As with "Celebrating the Diversity of Labor", images for the Project will be determined by consensus with the community through community meetings and brought before the City for review before fabrication starts. Community outreach will include articles in the paper, flyers, direct mailings, presentations at various community centers and cultural organizations, social media outlets and, of course, a weekly booth at the Farmer's Market, likely for the duration of the Project.

Project Process

Should the Council adopt Staff recommendations tonight, implementation of the *Watsonville Brillante* project includes the following process:

- Solicit Designs for Images As noted above, community outreach will be conducted to solicit designs for potential images to be turned into mosaic tile art.
- Approve Design Images As images are received and vetted through community processes, final images will be subject to City approval. Staff is currently working on revising the City's public art program and guidelines and plan to bring recommendations to the Council in March 2019. Approval of images for this Project will be subject to the approval process to be adopted by the Council and will include a contract with the artist defining this work.
- Approve Installation Artist and installer will obtain required building permits and comply with City's contractor requirements for construction on public property.
- Construct Tile Images Tile will be arranged over approved images to create mosaic-tiled art by community members at the Muzzio Park Community Centerthat will serve as the free space to create the mosaics. Adhesive will be applied to tiles to maintain their placement.
- Adhesion of Tiles to Parking Garage Tiles will be adhered, grouted and sealed over the exterior of the Parking Garage. Rinaldi Tile & Marble of 51 Fremont Street in Watsonville, a tile and marble installation contractor that has operated out of the Pajaro Valley since 1973, will perform this work at no charge.

Project Expenses

Core expenses for this Project include materials, labor and installation. All of these expenses would be funded through sponsorships and grants obtained by the Artist. Expenses to be incurred by the City are discussed in the following section of this report.

Request from Artist to City

Ms. Crocetti has requested the following in-kind contributions from the City:

- Five-year Lease at \$1/year Approve Lease for Muzzio Park Community Center at a rate of \$1.00 per year for use as a free arts center, where community members will design, plan and build the mosaics. Lease will be brought to Council for approval during the May Council meeting and will commence on June 1, 2019.
- Access to Garage During installation, access to a limited portion of the Garage with adequate signage and blockades from public access. Estimated at twice a year for 2 weeks over a period of 5 years.
- Access to Utilities Access to water and electricity in the Garage at no charge during installation.

In addition, the Artist is requesting that the City prepare the exterior walls of the Garage for installation of the mosaics. This may require pressure washing, sand blasting and/or repainting sections of the exterior concrete surfaces. The estimated cost of this work is between \$26,000-\$60,000. This request will not result in additional expenses to the City. The Garage is currently in need of pressure washing and repainting to maintain the structural integrity of the concrete. The current Capital Improvement Plan includes

\$110,000 for this work over the next two fiscal years. The mosaic installation is complementary to the long-term maintenance of the parking structure in that it will reduce the on-going expense of painting the Garage every several years.

Ms. Crocetti has also requested that the City waive the Building Permit and Planning fees for the installation of the Project in the amount of \$10,500.

Project and Facility Maintenance

The Fireclay tiles that will be used for this Project will be installed by Rinaldi's union tile installers. Rinaldi has performed outdoor tile installations on various large-scale projects across California. Their recommended and anticipated long-term maintenance post-installation consists solely of cleaning/pressure washing as needed. Maintenance beyond cleaning is not anticipated. Staff reached out to City of Santa Cruz officials who maintain Ms. Crocetti's mosaic tile art installations in their jurisdiction who have confirmed this limited level of required maintenance. The City's engineering team believes that the installation would help to protect the exterior walls of the structure from concrete deterioration and damage and would eliminate the need to paint it as part of routine maintenance.

The Artist

Ms. Crocetti has worked on and completed many public art projects, contributing 20 large-scale community driven public art works to the City of Santa Cruz over the past eight years, while working full time as an art teacher. These include mosaic art installations on levee walls, retaining walls, bridges and buildings. She lives in Watsonville and has a desire to invest in her home community.

In 2017, Ms. Crocetti was commissioned by the City of Watsonville to install sixteen mosaic medallions in downtown sidewalks. Her art process was centered around community building. The images and the title for the installation, "Celebrating the Diversity of Labor" were created in direct response to the desires of the community: to represent our history and our diversity. After listening and gathering input, over 100 drawings were generated for the Project, the community voted on the ones that they felt best represented them, then they helped fabricate them at the Farmer's Market and in her studio. The mosaics were professionally installed, with grouting completed by Ms. Crocetti and a team of volunteers from the community.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

The Council's adoption of this resolution is consistent with the Council's priorities of:

- Economic Development (Downtown Revitalization) by creating place making art in the heart of downtown
- Community Engagement & Well-Being (Parks and Community Services, Youth Activities & Programs) by engaging the community in the creation of large art installation
- Public Safety (Youth Prevention Programs) by providing youth with a safe, positive environment through the development of a free arts center

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The City would benefit from gaining a significant art piece in the core of the downtown area, without incurring the costs of materials and labor. Per the request from the Artist, the City's General Fund would contribute an estimated \$36,000-\$70,000 for the preparation of the exterior Garage walls for installation and waiving the building permit and processing fees. The costs associated with surface preparation are included in the current Capital Improvement Plan.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a resolution:

- 1.) Authorizing and directing the City Manager to execute a contract with LDA Partners, Inc., to prepare a facilities master plan for the Municipal Service Center; and
- 2.) Appropriating \$150,000 from the Solid Waste Fund to fund this planning effort.

DISCUSSION:

Background

The Municipal Service Center (MSC), located at 320 Harvest Drive, is the home facility for the majority of the City's maintenance and utility operations. These include:

- Solid Waste
- Water Services
- Customer Service
- Fleet maintenance

- Street maintenance
- Traffic maintenance
- Parks operations and maintenance
- Utilities administration

There are 116 employees working in these divisions that report to the MSC. It is expected that the maintenance and operations activities based at the MSC will grow and require more staff to perform them as the City grows over the coming years.

The MSC has been developed with a collection of buildings which house these operations. The most significant buildings at the MSC are:

- Administration building
- Water services
- Fleet maintenance
- Material Recovery Facility (Waste and Recycling Public Drop Off)
- Vehicle and equipment wash
- Miscellaneous storage buildings for materials, trucks and equipment

Most of these structures are pre-manufactured metal buildings while some of the buildings such as the administration building and water services are wood frame construction. Construction of the buildings at the MSC generally occurred between 1965 and 1985.

MSC Master Planning - Purpose and Need

Most of the existing MSC facilities have come to the end of their useful life, are poorly designed, are inadequate in size and configuration for existing staffing levels, and do not meet modern design and office environment standards.

<u>Project Goals</u> Staff has conceived a vision and a number of goals for improving the MSC. Staff envisions a more modern facility which:

- Provides adequate space for current and future staffing needs
- Provides adequate meeting rooms and break areas, adequate work stations for individuals, and shared work areas for field crews
- · Creates a centrally located administration building
- Complies with modern building standards
- Provides adequate protection for being located in a flood plain
- Improves the employee experience and workplace satisfaction
- Creates a more cohesive work environment to enhance the productivity of multiple teams working together

Scope of Work The Master plan work would include:

- Engineering evaluation of the condition of existing buildings to determine if they can be used as is, upgraded, or need to be replaced;
- Determine current and future space needs;
- Recommend optimal facility location and building layout for improved efficiency and flow of operations;
- Compile a prioritized list of building improvements/replacements with cost estimates;
- Develop a phasing plan to implement the priority projects while keeping MSC operations running during the construction

Consultant Selection Process. Staff advertised for qualification statements and received submittals from five architectural firms. Four of the firms were invited to present to a selection committee which ranked the firms. LDA Partners (LDA) was deemed the most qualified firm based on their extensive experience and qualifications.

LDA has performed planning and design services for many municipal corporation facilities in the recent past including working on projects for communities similar in size

to Watsonville. LDA is based in Stockton, California and has 19 employees. LDA will partner with surveying and civil engineering firms from Santa Cruz County, and will bring in specialty firms from various areas in the state to assist with vehicle maintenance, facility engineering, mechanical and plumbing engineering, and cost estimating.

The master planning process will be an interactive process that will include input from all staff currently using the facilities. Once a condition assessment report and conceptual plans options are developed, staff will present these options to the City Council for review. Once conceptual plans are finalized, staff will develop a financial and implementation plan for phased facility improvements over time.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The cost of the proposed scope of work is in an amount not to exceed \$150,000. This work will be paid for with an appropriation from the Solid Waste Enterprise Fund. There is adequate funding in the Solid Waste Fund to support this project. Since the Solid Waste Division has the greatest need for this project and is leading the effort, it will pay for the initial cost of the study; other departments and divisions will be charged for their proportionate share of the project cost once the work has been completed.

STRATEGIC PLAN:

This project is consistent with Goal 3, Infrastructure and Environment, Section D: Long-Term Capital Improvement Plan.

ALTERNATIVES:

Council can choose to not award the contract with LDA Partners, Inc. and not proceed with the MSC facility plan. However, this would have long-term impacts on the City's ability to plan for future facility upgrades as well as the services provided by the many teams that are based at the MSC.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WATSONVILLE AWARDING CONTRACT TO LDA PARTNERS, INC., A CORPORATION, TO PREPARE A LONG-TERM FACILITIES MASTER PLAN FOR THE CITY'S MUNICIPAL SERVICE CENTER, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$150,000, AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE CONTRACT; AND AUTHORIZING A \$150,000 BUDGET APPROPRIATION FROM THE SOLID WASTE FUND

WHEREAS, a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was issued on August 29, 2018, asking for qualified consultants to prepare a long-term facilities master plan for the City's Municipal Service Center; and

WHEREAS, the deadline for submittal of Request for Qualifications was September 14, 2018; and

WHEREAS, City staff ranked the proposals received for the consideration of the City Manager and submission to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager has recommended that the proposal from LDA Partners, Inc., a corporation, in an amount not to exceed \$150,000, be accepted as the best response.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WATSONVILLE, CALIFORNIA, AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the proposal of LDA Partners, Inc., a corporation, in an amount not to exceed \$150,000, is hereby accepted.
- 2. That the Contract for Consultant Services between the City of Watsonville and LDA Partners, Inc., a corporation, to prepare a long-term facilities master plan for the City's Municipal Service Center, a copy of which Contract is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, is fair and equitable and is hereby ratified and approved.

- Consultant shall file FPPC form 700s and 805s pursuant to section 19 of the 3. Contract.
- That the City Manager be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute 4. the Contract for and on behalf of the City.
- 5. That the \$150,000 budget appropriation from the Solid Waste Fund [0740] is hereby authorized.
 - 6. That all other proposals are hereby rejected.

CONTRACT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF WATSONVILLE AND LDA PARTNERS, INC.

THIS CONTRACT, is made and entered into this June 22nd, 2018, by and between the City of Watsonville, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called "City," and LDA Partners, Inc., an S Corporation, hereinafter called "Consultant."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the City needs to obtain certain professional, technical and/or specialized services of an independent contractor to assist the City in the most economical manner; and

WHEREAS, Consultant has the requisite skill, training, qualifications, and experience to render such services called for under this Contract to City.

THE PARTIES HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. SCOPE OF SERVICES. Consultant shall perform those services as specified in detail in Exhibit "A," entitled "SCOPE OF SERVICES" which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

SECTION 2. TERM OF CONTRACT. The term of this Contract shall be from February 13, 2019 to December 31, 2019, inclusive.

SECTION 3. SCHEDULE OF PERFORMANCE. The services of Consultant are to be completed according to the schedule set out in Exhibit "B," entitled "SCHEDULE OF PERFORMANCE," which is attached hereto and incorporated herein. Consultant will diligently proceed with the agreed Scope of Services and will provide such services in a timely manner in accordance with the "SCHEDULE OF PERFORMANCE."

SECTION 4. COMPENSATION. The compensation to be paid to Consultant including both payment for professional services and reimbursable expenses as well as the rate and schedule of payment are set out in Exhibit "C" entitled "COMPENSATION," which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

SECTION 5. METHOD OF PAYMENT. Except as otherwise provided in Exhibit "C," each month, Consultant shall furnish to the City a statement of the work performed for compensation during the preceding month. Such statement shall also include a detailed record of the month's actual reimbursable expenditures.

SECTION 6. INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT. It is understood and agreed that Consultant, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed by Consultant, shall act as and be an independent Consultant and not an agent or employee of City, and as an independent Consultant, shall obtain no rights to retirement

benefits or other benefits which accrue to City's employees, and Consultant hereby expressly waives any claim it may have to any such rights.

SECTION 7. ASSIGNABILITY. Consultant shall not assign or transfer any interest in this Contract nor the performance of any of Consultant's obligations hereunder, without the prior written consent of City, and any attempt by Consultant to so assign this Contract or any rights, duties or obligations arising hereunder shall be void and of no effect.

SECTION 8. INDEMNIFICATION. To the full extent permitted by law (subject to the limitations of Civil Code section 2782.8 for any "design professional services" performed under this Agreement), Consultant will indemnify, hold harmless, release and defend the City (including its officers, elected or appointed officials, employees, volunteers or agents) from and against any and all liability or claims (including actions, demands, damages, injuries, settlements, losses or costs [including legal costs and attorney's fees])(collectively "Liability") of any nature, to the extent arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to Consultant's negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct in the performance of this Agreement. In no event shall the cost to defend charged to the Consultant exceed the Consultant's proportionate percentage of fault. Consultant's indemnification obligations under this Agreement are not limited by any limitations of any insurance held by Consultant, including, but not limited to, workers compensation insurance.

SECTION 9. INSURANCE.

- A. Errors and Omissions Insurance. Consultant shall obtain and maintain in full force throughout the term of this Contract a professional liability insurance policy (Errors and Omissions), in a company authorized to issue such insurance in the State of California, with limits of liability of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) to cover all professional services rendered pursuant to this Contract.
- B. Auto and Commercial General Liability Insurance. Consultant shall also maintain in full force and effect for the term of this Contract, automobile insurance and commercial general liability insurance with an insurance carrier satisfactory to City, which insurance shall include protection against claims arising from bodily and personal injury, including death resulting therefrom, and damage to property resulting from any actual occurrence arising out of the performance of this Contract. The amounts of insurance shall not be less than the following:
- (1) Commercial general liability insurance, or equivalent form, with a combined single limit of not less than \$500,000.00 per occurrence. If such insurance contains a general aggregate limit, such limit shall apply separately to each project Consultant performs for City. Such insurance shall (a) name City, its appointed and elected officials, and its employees as insureds; and (b) be primary with respect to insurance or self-insurance programs maintained by City and (c) contain standard separation of insured's provisions.
- (2) Business automobile liability insurance, or equivalent form, with a combined single limit of not less than \$500,000.00 per occurrence. Such insurance shall include coverage for owned, hired and non-owned automobiles.

- C. Workers' Compensation Insurance. In accordance with the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code, Consultant shall be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or undertake self-insurance. Consultant agrees to comply with such provisions before commencing performance of any work under this Contract.
- D. Proof of Insurance to City before Notice to Proceed to Work. Consultant shall satisfactorily provide certificates and endorsements of insurance to the City Clerk before Notice to Proceed to Work of this Contract will be issued. Certificates and policies shall state that the policy shall not be canceled or reduced in coverage without thirty (30) days written notice to City. Approval of insurance by City shall not relieve or decrease the extent to which Consultant may be held responsible for payment of damages resulting from services or operations performed pursuant to this Contract. Consultant shall not perform any work under this Contract until Consultant has obtained the required insurance and until the required certificates have been submitted to the City and approved by the City Attorney. If Consultant fails or refuses to produce or maintain the insurance required by these provisions, or fails or refuses to furnish City required proof that insurance has been procured and is in force and paid for, City shall have the right at City's election to forthwith terminate this Contract immediately without any financial or contractual obligation to the City. As a result of such termination, the City reserves the right to employ another consultant to complete the project.
- E. Written notice. Contractor shall provide immediate written notice if (1) any insurance policy required by this Contract is terminated; (2) any policy limit is reduced; (3) or any deductible or self insured retention is increased.

SECTION 10. NON-DISCRIMINATION. Consultant shall not discriminate, in any way, against any person on the basis of age, sex, race, color, creed, national origin or disability in connection with or related to the performance of this Contract.

SECTION 11. TERMINATION.

- A. City and Consultant shall have the right to terminate this Contract, without cause, by giving not less than ten (10) days written notice of termination.
- B. If Consultant fails to perform any of its material obligations under this Contract, in addition to all other remedies provided by law, City may terminate this Contract immediately upon written notice.
- C. The City Manager is empowered to terminate this Contract on behalf of City.
- D. In the event of termination, Consultant shall deliver to City copies of all work papers, schedules, reports and other work performed by Consultant and upon receipt thereof, Consultant shall be paid in full for services performed and reimbursable expenses incurred to the date of termination.
- **SECTION 12. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS.** Consultant shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, codes and regulations of the federal, state and local governments. Consultant shall obtain and maintain a City of Watsonville business license during the term of this Contract.

SECTION 13. GOVERNING LAW. City and Consultant agree that the law governing this Contract shall be that of the State of California. Any suit brought by either party against the other arising out of the performance of this Contract shall be filed and maintained in the Municipal or Superior Court of the County of Santa Cruz.

SECTION 14. PRIOR CONTRACTS AND AMENDMENTS. This Contract represents the entire understanding of the parties as to those matters contained herein. No prior oral or written understanding shall be of any force or effect with respect to those matters covered hereunder. This Contract may only be modified by a written amendment.

SECTION 15. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. All data, documents, discussions or other information developed or received by or for Consultant in performance of this Contract are confidential and not to be disclosed to any person except as authorized by the City Manager or his designee, or as required by law.

SECTION 16. OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS. All reports, documents or other materials developed or received by Consultant or any other person engaged directly by Consultant to perform the services required hereunder shall be and remain the property of City without restriction or limitation upon their use.

SECTION 17. COVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES. The Consultant covenants that Consultant has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Consultant, to solicit or secure the Contract, and that Consultant has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Consultant, any fees, commissions, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration contingent on or resulting from the award or making of this Contract, for breach or violation of this covenant, the City shall have the right to annul this Contract without liability, or in its discretion, to deduct from the Contract price or consideration or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage fee, gift, or contingency.

SECTION 18. WAIVER. Consultant agrees that waiver by City or any one or more of the conditions of performance under this Contract shall not be construed as waiver of any other condition of performance under this Contract.

SECTION 19. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

- A. A Consultant shall avoid all conflict of interest or appearance of conflict of interest in performance of this Contract. Consultant shall file a disclosure statement, if required by City Council Resolution, which shall be filed within thirty (30) days from the effective date of this Contract or such Resolution, as applicable.
- B. No member, officer, or employee of the City, during their tenure, or for one (1) year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract or the proceeds thereof and Consultant agrees not to allow, permit, grant, transfer, or otherwise do anything which will result in such member, officer, or employee of the City from having such interest.

SECTION 20. AUDIT BOOKS AND RECORDS. Consultant shall make available to City, its authorized agents, officers and employees, for examination any and all ledgers and books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks and other records or documents evidencing or related to the expenditures and disbursements charged to the City, and shall furnish to City, its authorized agents and employees, such other evidence or information as City may require with respect to any such expense or disbursement charged by Consultant.

SECTION 21. NOTICES. All notices shall be personally served or mailed, postage prepaid, to the following addresses, or to such other address as may be designated by written notice by the parties:

Thank you for the opportunity to assist you, and the City with the site assessment and Master Plan of its existing Municipal Service Center. The following represents our understanding of the project as discussed:

Project Scope:

This Scope of Work includes a site assessment and feasibility/masterplan for the 7 acre Municipal Service Center. This facility serves as the corporation yard for the majority of the City's maintenance and operations divisions, including: Water Distribution, Water Customer Service, Fleet Maintenance, Sanitation, Street/Traffic Maintenance, Utilities Administration and Management, and Parks Maintenance. The project is broken out into 2 phases,

I. Existing Site Analysis

II. Concept Programming / Masterplan

Our assembled project team is made up of industry experts and are as follows:

Phase I. Existing Site Analysis Scope of Work

Meet, review, & discuss project criteria and program with the City to define:

- Existing Spatial needs for various City services related to the MSC
- Perform a site assessment of facility.
- Review and assess existing utility and infrastructure
- Review the site layout should the City augment the MSC with available land at the south end and/or the north end.
- Identify deficiencies, if any
- Issue final assessment report.
- Existing Site analysis will include:

A. Architectural

- Review of spatial needs consistent with existing and projected staffing levels
- Review of existing facility in conjunction with disables access
- Review of existing facility with current workflow needs and service requirements

C. Civil

- Review existing as built plans and topographic mapping to determine the extent of the existing wet utilities
 and storm drains currently serving the site. Assess the future wet utility and storm drain needs to
 accommodate a new Administration Building and Fleet Facility. Prepare exhibits showing existing and
 proposed future utility upgrades needed for the proposed facilities. We plan on utilizing the topographic
 mapping by Mid Coast Engineers as a base map for our exhibits. We are assuming that the existing wet
 utilities will be indicated on the survey or that the City will provide us with as built drawings.
- Since the proposed facilities will be located within the FEMA Zone AE, we will investigate potential flood
 mitigation measures which might include raising finished floors to greater than one foot above the base

- Provide topographic horizontal survey control and survey the boundaries of client's property. Said survey
 to aid in easement disclosures from title report pro-vided by others. The setting of missing corner
 monuments is not included in this proposal.
- Establish vertical survey control and perform a topographic survey of the client's property resolving
 contours at one foot increments and including location of surface observable features that might affect the
 client's development plans for the property, including locations of existing sewer man-holes, catch basins,
 power vaults, telephone pedestals, buildings, and other features that are apparent from surface

- 12. LDA Partners, Inc., will not be providing inspections or testing before, during or after construction.
- 13. LEED design or Commissioning
- 14. Modifications required by the enactment or revision of codes, laws, or regulations subsequent to the preparation of such documents.
- 15. Providing services required due to significant Project scope changes, including, but not limited to, size, quality, complexity, the approved Project schedule, or the method of bidding or negotiating and contracting for construction.

All monthly billings not paid within 30 days shall be considered past due, and shall accrue interest from the 31st day at a rate of 1-1/2% per month or 18% per annum. COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY EXTENSION

This endorsement modifies insurance provided under the following:

COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY COVERAGE PART

INDEX

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With respect to coverage afforded by this endorsement, the provisions of the policy apply unless modified by the endorsement.

A. NON-OWNED AIRCRAFT

Under Paragraph 2. Exclusions of Section I - Coverage A - Bodily Injury And Property Damage Liability, exclusion g. Aircraft, Auto Or Watercraft does not apply to an aircraft provided:

- 1. It is not owned by any insured;
- 2. It is hired, chartered or loaned with a trained paid crew;
- 3. The pilot in command holds a currently effective certificate, issued by the duly constituted authority of the United States of America or Canada, designating her or him a commercial or airline pilot; and
- 4. It is not being used to carry persons or property for a charge.

However, the insurance afforded by this provision does not apply if there is available to the insured other valid and collectible insurance, whether primary, excess (other than insurance written to apply specifically in excess of this policy), contingent or on any other basis, that would also apply to the loss covered under this provision.

B. NON-OWNED WATERCRAFT

Under Paragraph 2. Exclusions of Section I - Coverage A - Bodily Injury And Property Damage Liability, Subparagraph (2) of exclusion g. Aircraft, Auto Or Watercraft is replaced by the following:

This exclusion does not apply to:

- (2) A watercraft you do not own that is:
 - (a) Less than 52 feet long; and
 - (b) Not being used to carry persons or property for a charge.

C. PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABILITY - ELEVATORS

- 1. Under Paragraph 2. Exclusions of Section I Coverage A Bodily Injury And Property Damage Liability, Subparagraphs (3), (4) and (6) of exclusion j. Damage To Property do not apply if such "property damage" results from the use of elevators. For the purpose of this provision, elevators do not include vehicle lifts. Vehicle lifts are lifts or hoists used in automobile service or repair operations.
- 2. The following is added to Section IV Commercial General Liability Conditions, Condition 4. Other Insurance, Paragraph b. Excess Insurance:

The insurance afforded by this provision of this endorsement is excess over any property insurance, whether primary, excess, contingent or on any other basis.

D. EXTENDED DAMAGE TO PROPERTY RENTED TO YOU (Tenant's Property Damage)

If Damage To Premises Rented To You is not otherwise excluded from this Coverage Part:

- 1. Under Paragraph 2. Exclusions of Section I Coverage A Bodily Injury and Property Damage Liability:
 - **a.** The fourth from the last paragraph of exclusion **j. Damage To Property** is replaced by the following:

Paragraphs (1), (3) and (4) of this exclusion do not apply to "property damage" (other than damage by fire, lightning, explosion, smoke, or leakage from an automatic fire protection system) to:

- (i) Premises rented to you for a period of 7 or fewer consecutive days; or
- (ii) Contents that you rent or lease as part of a premises rental or lease agreement for a period of more than 7 days.

Paragraphs (1), (3) and (4) of this exclusion do not apply to "property damage" to contents of premises rented to you for a period of 7 or fewer consecutive days.

A separate limit of insurance applies to this coverage as described in **Section III - Limits of Insurance.**

The last paragraph of subsection **2. Exclusions** is replaced by the following:

Exclusions c. through n. do not apply to damage by fire, lightning, explosion, smoke or leakage from automatic fire protection systems to premises while rented to you or temporarily occupied by you with permission of the owner. A separate limit of insurance applies to Damage To Premises Rented To You as described in Section III - Limits Of Insurance.

- Paragraph 6. under Section III Limits Of Insurance is replaced by the following:
 - Subject to Paragraph 5. above, the Damage To Premises Rented To You Limit is the most we will pay under Coverage A for damages because of "property damage" to:
 - a. Any one premise:
 - (1) While rented to you; or
 - (2) While rented to you or temporarily occupied by you with permission of the owner for damage by fire, lightning, explosion, smoke or leakage from automatic protection systems; or
 - b. Contents that you rent or lease as part of a premises rental or lease agreement.
- 3. As regards coverage provided by this provision D. EXTENDED DAMAGE TO PROPERTY RENTED TO YOU (Tenant's Property Damage) - Paragraph 9.a. of Definitions is replaced with the following:
 - 9.a. A contract for a lease of premises. However, that portion of the contract for a lease of premises that indemnifies any person or organization for damage by fire, lightning, explosion, smoke, or leakage from automatic fire protection systems to premises while rented to you or temporarily occupied by you with the permission of the owner, or for damage to contents of such premises that are included in your premises rental or lease agreement, is not an "insured contract".

E. MEDICAL PAYMENTS EXTENSION

If Coverage C Medical Payments is not otherwise excluded, the Medical Payments provided by this policy are amended as follows:

Under Paragraph 1. Insuring Agreement of Section I - Coverage C - Medical Payments, Subparagraph **(b)** of Paragraph **a.** is replaced by the following:

(b) The expenses are incurred and reported within three years of the date of the accident; and

F. EXTENSION OF SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENTS - COVERAGES A AND B

- 1. Under Supplementary Payments Coverages A and B, Paragraph 1.b. is replaced by the following:
 - b. Up to \$3,000 for cost of bail bonds required because of accidents or traffic law violations arising out of the use of any vehicle to which the Bodily Injury Liability Coverage applies. We do not have to furnish these bonds.
- Paragraph 1.d. is replaced by the following:
 - All reasonable expenses incurred by the insured at our request to assist us in the investigation or defense of the claim or "suit", including actual loss of earnings up to \$500 a day because of time off from work.

G. ADDITIONAL INSUREDS - BY CONTRACT, AGREEMENT OR PERMIT

- Paragraph 2. under Section II Who Is An Insured is amended to include as an insured any person or organization whom you have agreed to add as an additional insured in a written contract, written agreement or permit. Such person or organization is an additional insured but only with respect to liability for "bodily injury", "property damage" or "personal and advertising injury" caused in whole or in part by:
 - Your acts or omissions, or the acts or omissions of those acting on your behalf, in the performance of your on going operations for the additional insured that are the subject of the written contract or written agreement provided that the "bodily injury" or "property damage" occurs, or the "personal and advertising injury" is committed, subsequent to the signing of such written contract or written agreement; or

- **b.** Premises or facilities rented by you or used by you; or
- The maintenance, operation or use by you of equipment rented or leased to you by such person or organization; or
- **d.** Operations performed by you or on your behalf for which the state or political subdivision has issued a permit subject to the following additional provisions:
 - (1) This insurance does not apply to "bodily injury", "property damage", or "personal and advertising injury" arising out of the operations performed for the state or political subdivision;
 - (2) This insurance does not apply to "bodily injury" or "property damage" included within the "completed operations hazard".
 - (3) Insurance applies to premises you own, rent, or control but only with respect to the following hazards:
 - (a) The existence, maintenance, repair, construction, erection, or removal of advertising signs, awnings, canopies, cellar entrances, coal holes, driveways, manholes, marquees, hoist away openings, sidewalk vaults, street banners, or decorations and similar exposures; or
 - (b) The construction, erection, or removal of elevators; or
 - (c) The ownership, maintenance, or use of any elevators covered by this insurance.

However:

- 1. The insurance afforded to such additional insured only applies to the extent permitted by law; and
- If coverage provided to the additional insured is required by a contract or agreement, the insurance afforded to such additional insured will not be broader than that which you are required by the contract or agreement to provide for such additional insured.

With respect to Paragraph 1.a. above, a person's or organization's status as an additional insured under this endorsement ends when:

- (1) All work, including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work, on the project (other than service, maintenance or repairs) to be performed by or on behalf of the additional insured(s) at the location of the covered operations has been completed; or
- (2) That portion of "your work" out of which the injury or damage arises has been put to its intended use by any person or organization other than another contractor or subcontractor engaged in performing operations for a principal as a part of the same project.

With respect to Paragraph 1.b. above, a person's or organization's status as an additional insured under this endorsement ends when their written contract or written agreement with you for such premises or facilities ends.

With respects to Paragraph 1.c. above, this insurance does not apply to any "occurrence" which takes place after the equipment rental or lease agreement has expired or you have returned such equipment to the lessor.

The insurance provided by this endorsement applies only if the written contract or written agreement is signed prior to the "bodily injury" or "property damage".

We have no duty to defend an additional insured under this endorsement until we receive written notice of a "suit" by the additional insured as required in Paragraph b. of Condition 2. Duties In the Event Of Occurrence, Offense, Claim Or Suit under Section IV - Commercial General Liability Conditions.

2. With respect to the insurance provided by this endorsement, the following are added to Paragraph 2. Exclusions under Section I - Coverage A - Bodily Injury And Property Damage Liability:

This insurance does not apply to:

- a. "Bodily injury" or "property damage" arising from the sole negligence of the additional insured.
- **b.** "Bodily injury" or "property damage" that occurs prior to you commencing operations at the location where such "bodily injury" or "property damage" occurs.
- **c.** "Bodily injury", "property damage" or "personal and advertising injury" arising out of the rendering of, or the failure to render, any professional architectural, engineering or surveying services, including:
 - (1) The preparing, approving, or failing to prepare or approve, maps, shop drawings, opinions, reports, surveys, field orders, change orders or drawings and specifications; or
 - (2) Supervisory, inspection, architectural or engineering activities.

This exclusion applies even if the claims against any insured allege negligence or other wrongdoing in the supervision, hiring, employment, training or monitoring of others by that insured, if the "occurrence" which caused the "bodily injury" or "property damage", or the offense which caused the "personal and advertising injury", involved the rendering of, or the failure to render, any professional architectural, engineering or surveying services.

- d. "Bodily injury" or "property damage" occurring after:
 - (1) All work, including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work, on the project (other than service, maintenance or repairs) to be performed by or on behalf of the additional insured(s) at the location of the covered operations has been completed; or
 - (2) That portion of "your work" out of which the injury or damage arises has been put to its intended use by any person or organization other than another contractor or subcontractor engaged in performing operations for a principal as a part of the same project.
- **e.** Any person or organization specifically designated as an additional insured for ongoing operations by a separate **ADDITIONAL INSURED -OWNERS**, **LESSEES OR CONTRACTORS** endorsement issued by us and made a part of this policy.
- With respect to the insurance afforded to these additional insureds, the following is added to Section III

 Limits Of Insurance:

If coverage provided to the additional insured is required by a contract or agreement, the most we will pay on behalf of the additional insured is the amount of insurance:

- a. Required by the contract or agreement; or
- **b.** Available under the applicable Limits of Insurance shown in the Declarations; whichever is less.

This endorsement shall not increase the applicable Limits of Insurance shown in the Declarations.

H. PRIMARY AND NON-CONTRIBUTORY ADDITIONAL INSURED EXTENSION

This provision applies to any person or organization who qualifies as an additional insured under any form or endorsement under this policy.

Condition 4. Other Insurance of SECTION IV - COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY CONDITIONS is amended as follows:

a. The following is added to Paragraph a. Primary Insurance:

If an additional insured's policy has an Other Insurance provision making its policy excess, and you have agreed in a written contract or written agreement to provide the additional insured coverage on a primary and noncontributory basis, this policy shall be primary and we will not seek contribution from the additional insured's policy for damages we cover.



When a written contract or written agreement, other than a premises lease, facilities rental contract or agreement, an equipment rental or lease contract or agreement, or permit issued by a state or political subdivision between you and an additional insured does not require this insurance to be primary or primary and non-contributory, this insurance is excess over any other insurance for which the additional insured is designated as a Named Insured.

Regardless of the written agreement between you and an additional insured, this insurance is excess over any other insurance whether primary, excess, contingent or on any other basis for which the additional insured has been added as an additional insured on other policies.

I. ADDITIONAL INSUREDS - EXTENDED PROTECTION OF YOUR "LIMITS OF INSURANCE"

This provision applies to any person or organization who qualifies as an additional insured under any form or endorsement under this policy.

1. The following is added to Condition 2. Duties In The Event Of Occurrence, Offense, Claim or Suit:

An additional insured under this endorsement will as soon as practicable:

- a. Give written notice of an "occurrence" or an offense that may result in a claim or "suit" under this insurance to us:
- **b.** Tender the defense and indemnity of any claim or "suit" to all insurers whom also have insurance available to the additional insured; and
- **c.** Agree to make available any other insurance which the additional insured has for a loss we cover under this Coverage Part.
- **d.** We have no duty to defend or indemnify an additional insured under this endorsement until we receive written notice of a "suit" by the additional insured.
- 2. The limits of insurance applicable to the additional insured are those specified in a written contract or written agreement or the limits of insurance as stated in the Declarations of this policy and defined in Section III Limits of Insurance of this policy, whichever are less. These limits are inclusive of and not in addition to the limits of insurance available under this policy.

J. WHO IS AN INSURED - INCIDENTAL MEDICAL ERRORS / MALPRACTICE WHO IS AN INSURED - FELLOW EMPLOYEE EXTENSION - MANAGEMENT EMPLOYEES

Paragraph 2.a.(1) of Section II - Who Is An Insured is replaced with the following:

- (1) "Bodily injury" or "personal and advertising injury":
 - (a) To you, to your partners or members (if you are a partnership or joint venture), to your members (if you are a limited liability company), to a co-"employee" while in the course of his or her employment or performing duties related to the conduct of your business, or to your other "volunteer workers" while performing duties related to the conduct of your business;
 - (b) To the spouse, child, parent, brother or sister of that co-"employee" or "volunteer worker" as a consequence of Paragraph (1) (a) above;
 - (c) For which there is any obligation to share damages with or repay someone else who must pay damages because of the injury described in Paragraphs (1) (a) or (b) above; or
 - (d) Arising out of his or her providing or failing to provide professional health care services. However, if you are not in the business of providing professional health care services or providing professional health care personnel to others, or if coverage for providing professional health care services is not otherwise excluded by separate endorsement, this provision (Paragraph (d)) does not apply.

Paragraphs (a) and (b) above do not apply to "bodily injury" or "personal and advertising injury" caused by an "employee" who is acting in a supervisory capacity for you. Supervisory capacity as used herein means the "employee's" job responsibilities assigned by you, includes the direct supervision of other "employees" of yours. However, none of these "employees" are insureds for "bodily injury" or "personal and

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advertising injury" arising out of their willful conduct, which is defined as the purposeful or willful intent to cause "bodily injury" or "personal and advertising injury", or caused in whole or in part by their intoxication by liquor or controlled substances.

The coverage provided by provision **J.** is excess over any other valid and collectable insurance available to your "employee".

K. NEWLY FORMED OR ADDITIONALLY ACQUIRED ENTITIES

Paragraph 3. of Section II - Who Is An Insured is replaced by the following:

- **3.** Any organization you newly acquire or form and over which you maintain ownership or majority interest, will qualify as a Named Insured if there is no other similar insurance available to that organization. However:
 - **a.** Coverage under this provision is afforded only until the expiration of the policy period in which the entity was acquired or formed by you;
 - **b.** Coverage **A** does not apply to "bodily injury" or "property damage" that occurred before you acquired or formed the organization; and
 - **c.** Coverage **B** does not apply to "personal and advertising injury" arising out of an offense committed before you acquired or formed the organization.
 - d. Records and descriptions of operations must be maintained by the first Named Insured.

No person or organization is an insured with respect to the conduct of any current or past partnership, joint venture or limited liability company that is not shown as a Named Insured in the Declarations or qualifies as an insured under this provision.

L. FAILURE TO DISCLOSE HAZARDS AND PRIOR OCCURRENCES

Under Section IV - Commercial General Liability Conditions, the following is added to Condition 6. Representations:

Your failure to disclose all hazards or prior "occurrences" existing as of the inception date of the policy shall not prejudice the coverage afforded by this policy provided such failure to disclose all hazards or prior "occurrences" is not intentional.

M. KNOWLEDGE OF OCCURRENCE, OFFENSE, CLAIM OR SUIT

Under Section IV - Commercial General Liability Conditions, the following is added to Condition 2. Duties In The Event of Occurrence, Offense, Claim Or Suit:

Knowledge of an "occurrence", offense, claim or "suit" by an agent, servant or "employee" of any insured shall not in itself constitute knowledge of the insured unless an insured listed under Paragraph 1. of Section II - Who Is An Insured or a person who has been designated by them to receive reports of "occurrences", offenses, claims or "suits" shall have received such notice from the agent, servant or "employee".

N. LIBERALIZATION CLAUSE

If we revise this Commercial General Liability Extension Endorsement to provide more coverage without additional premium charge, your policy will automatically provide the coverage as of the day the revision is effective in your state.

O. BODILY INJURY REDEFINED

Under Section V - Definitions, Definition 3. is replaced by the following:

3. "Bodily Injury" means physical injury, sickness or disease sustained by a person. This includes mental anguish, mental injury, shock, fright or death that results from such physical injury, sickness or disease.



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P. EXTENDED PROPERTY DAMAGE

Exclusion a. of **COVERAGE A. BODILY INJURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABILITY** is replaced by the following:

a. Expected Or Intended Injury

"Bodily injury" or "property damage" expected or intended from the standpoint of the insured. This exclusion does not apply to "bodily injury" or "property damage" resulting from the use of reasonable force to protect persons or property.

Q. WAIVER OF TRANSFER OF RIGHTS OF RECOVERY AGAINST OTHERS TO US - WHEN REQUIRED IN A CONTRACT OR AGREEMENT WITH YOU

Under Section IV - Commercial General Liability Conditions, the following is added to Condition 8. Transfer Of Rights Of Recovery Against Others To Us:
