SUBJECT: APPROVE APPLICATION FOR PUBLIC ART AT GHWR YOUTH CENTER, SUBMITTED BY PAJARO VALLEY ARTS COUNCIL

STATEMENT OF ISSUES:

Public Art Application submitted for approval.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Commission approve the Teen Artes Summer 2025 Mural Project to be placed at the GHWR Youth Center located at 30 Maple Avenue.

DISCUSSION:

Background

The Teen Artes Program is part of Pajaro Valley Arts and is funded through the California Arts Council. High school students who participate in the 10-week program explore their creativity, learn new artistic skills, learn the operations of a gallery, visit galleries in the area, learn about local murals, and create their own public art mural. These students obtain hands-on experience working with local artists to help them explore career fields in the arts. Last year's mural was placed on two walls of the Callaghan Park Cultural Center.

The Project

The GHWR Youth Center's greenhouse area was identified as the recommended location for the Teen Artes Summer 2025 Mural Project. A total of twelve students from local schools are given the opportunity to participate in the program. Local professional muralist, Melissa Marzan was selected as the lead artist for this year's Teen Artes Summer 2025 project, where student applicants and alumni will take the lead in developing the design under her mentorship and guidance.

Students will begin painting mural from July 21st through July 27th and plan to host a ribbon cutting ceremony in August.

Mural Description : "Youthful Journey to Hope"

The mural celebrates the spirit of youth through colorful, nostalgic elements like games, sports, and more activities, which symbolize playfulness, shared experiences, and the excitement of being young. It highlights the transition from childhood to adulthood, encouraging viewers to reconnect with their inner child and embrace their evolving journey. Themes of nature including roses, sunflowers, lush greenery, rainbows, and celestial elements like the sun and moon—reflect growth, resilience, and the journey between the night and day time. The mural will serve as a beacon of hope and optimism, with the rainbow and affirmations of inclusivity and pride for all, including LGBTQ+ youth.

Beyond its visual impact, the mural is designed to bring the community together, offering a playful yet meaningful piece that celebrates collective and individual growth. It aims to inspire both current and future generations, encouraging them to be joyful about growing up in a town enriched by art and filled with opportunities to feel joy, connection, and creativity. The use of bright colors and nostalgic themes evokes a sense of fun and wonder, inspiring hope and reaffirming that there is always beauty and light ahead, even during challenging times.

Ultimately, this mural stands as a joyful, colorful testament to imagination, resilience, and community spirit. It is a collaborative gift to the youth center and to Watsonville as a whole—an invitation to dream big, celebrate each other, and remember that through art, we can build a stronger, more vibrant, and more inclusive future. Through its interactive, game-inspired layout, the mural will be a thoughtful representation of youth culture, nature, and community spirit, celebrating the playful heart of the young people who call the Youth Center home.

The mural will feature bright colors and follow a board game-inspired concept, with various destinations and pathways that guide the viewers throughout the artwork. There will also be reds, oranges, yellow, greens, blues, turquoise, purples, and earthy colors as this will be painted in their back garden area.
