10. PRESENTATIONS & ORAL COMMUNICATIONS

10.a ORAL COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE PUBLIC (2 MINUTES EACH)

Steve Trujillo, District 7, expressed concerns with fireworks use in his neighborhood and requested fireworks be banned in City limits.

Dr. Nancy Bilicich thanked Parks & Community Services for their work on the Bridge Street medians. She spoke about the first meeting of Pájaro River Watershed FPA (Flood Protection Authority) and their focus. She spoke about approval of Senate Bill 496 and positive effects it would have on residents living near the Pájaro River Levee.

Kayla Gomez, program assistant at Santa Cruz Community Ventures, spoke about the success of their programs.

Xitlali expressed her concerns with the outreach efforts for the Ad-HOC Committee on Policing and Social Equity survey. She asked the City to consider multi-family homes and the homeless population when sending one survey to each household.

Eli, District 7, express her concerns regarding outreach efforts for the Ad-HOC Committee on Policing and Social Equity survey, especially in relation to one paper survey mailed per home where various people and families lived. She added that questions on the survey were skewed and gave suggestions as to how to improve surveys in the future.

Celeste questioned why the City had not raised the Progress Flag on City flag poles and why the City had not launched an investigation into Tamario Smith's death while in custody.

Gabriel Medina asked the City to allocate more funding for Parks & Recreation. He asked Council to explore ways to reduce funding for Police to protect black lives and the LGBTQ community. He also asked the City to consider multi-family homes when sending one surveys to each household.

Dr. Christine Rosales expressed her concerns with racism and oppression thriving in the City.

Edgar Ernesto Ibarra Gutierrez asked Council to participate in decisions regarding the juvenile justice system and make efforts to support those returning to the community by offering programs to ensure their success.

Bernie Gomez expressed his concerns with community policing and requested Council analyze the budget to provide more funding for programs that prevent youth from engaging in illegal activity.

Jessica Carrasco requested additional funding be allocated for the Library.

Elias asked Council to defund Police and reinvest it into the community.

Karina Moreno asked Council to reduce policing and invest funds into the community.

10.b ORAL COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE COUNCIL (2 MINUTES EACH)

Member Hurst spoke about many challenges the City faced with the limited revenues from utilities and taxes. He invited the public to participate in the upcoming AMBAG meeting and visit

the RedBall exhibit at Cabrillo College. He asked the public to cease illegal fireworks use or face a fine.

Member García spoke about her participation in the Water Education for Latino Leaders Conference, and as a result, submitted questions to Public Works and Utilities Director Palmisano regarding the City's water supply, impact to public works from building and construction trade unions, quantity of jobs public works provides outside of City employment, lead in water lines, assessment of water system by the State, nitrates in water supply for agriculture, conservation water rates, and potential use of lease revenues to offset water bills for seniors, disabled residents, and farmworkers.

Member González announced Santa Cruz Climate Action Network partnered with the Watsonville Public Library to award winners of the Climate Action Photo Contest, on display at the Library. He stated Santa Cruz County Metropolitan Transit District bus operators were assisting Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) continue bus routes due to loss of operators after a mass shooting targeting VTA operators. He encouraged residents to contact Community Action Board to receive assistance with overdue rent and utilities. He invited the public to Pájaro Valley Arts' Pencas del Corazón exhibit.

Member Estrada commended those who organized and participated in remote learning through the public education system. He congratulated all graduating students.

Mayor Pro Tempore Parker announced the launch of the Regional Women's Business Center and listed services offered. She commended those who organized and participated in remote learning through the public education system. She asked the public to drive safely and prevent accidents. She asked the public to donate to Elise Miller's GoFundMe, who was a recent victim of a vehicle accident.

Mayor Dutra commended those who organized and participated in remote learning through the public education system. He spoke about his participation in I.S.T.W. celebrations where a new queen was crowned. He invited the public to participate in the Fourth of July Bike Ride and participate in the home decorating contest. He stated he would work with City Manager Huffaker to address fireworks concerns.

Assistant City Manager Vides and City Manager Huffaker answered questions from Member García regarding potential funding for a tenant-landlord conflict resolution initiative, integration of the Health in All Policy within Strategic Goal 5, and potential partnership with Youth Action Network of United Way to focus on youth development.

Assistant City Manager Vides, in answering Member Estrada, spoke about the environmental stewardship as part of the strategic plan.

In answering Member González, Assistant City Manager Vides spoke about the potential of adding the Climate Action Plan as a new strategy in the Strategic Plan.

3) Public Input

Steve Trujillo asked the City to partner with homeowner associations to plant more trees citywide. He asked the City to adopt principles and practices of the State Teachers Retirement System. He spoke about challenges the community faced as part of use of illegal fireworks.

Celeste questioned as to why the Strategic Plan Workshop was noticed only 24 hours in advance of the meeting and why it was held at the Corralitos Filter Plant. She asked the Council to increase community involvement in meetings.

Eli asked for more community input on the Strategic Plan and that workshops be held virtually to increase public participation. She added that those types of meetings should be noticed in advance to increase public participation.

Juan Gomez asked Council to pursue racial equity citywide and allocate funding for engagement with apartment complex residents.

Stephanie Brown Lou asked Council to increase outreach efforts to the community through social media and virtual meetings.

Gabriel Medina asked Council to consider non-profits when approving the Strategic Plan and increase funding for those organizations.

Elias asked Council to prioritize creation of affordable homes, youth programs, and

support non-profits.

Edgar Ibarra asked Council to increase outreach to the community, be transparent when campaigning, increase youth development programs, and pursue creation of jobs with benefits.

Xitlali asked Council to routinely assess progress made in regards to the Strategic Plan and its relation to the budget. She added that the City should adjust Police budget to allow for more youth and community programming.

Bernie Gomez spoke about challenges of living in Watsonville due to high home prices. He asked Council to be equitable with their decision making and to beautify the City.

Cesar Lara, Monterey Bay Central Labor Council, asked Council to prioritize funding and programing for Parks & Recreation.

12.a PROPOSED FY 2021-22 AND 2022-23 BUDGET & RELATED ACTIONS

1) Staff Report by Administrative Services Director Czerwin

2) City Council Clarifying & Technical Questions

Administrative Services Director Czerwin, Parks & Community Services Director Calubaquib, and Housing Manager Landaverry answered questions from Member García regarding plans to obtain public input for use of American Rescue Plan funds, funding of the Science Workshop, salary adjustments for Science Workshop staff, staffing and funding of the Police Activities League, dissolution and remnants of the Redevelopment agency, inclusionary housing fund use, and use of development fees toward housing programs.

Administrative Services Director Czerwin, in answering Member Estrada, spoke about the potential effect the Ad Hoc Committee on Policing and Social Equity's recommendations on the budget would have on the City. Administrative Services Director Czerwin spoke about outreach and community input on the budget.

Library Director Martinez, in answering Member Estrada, spoke about plans for future events and programs to continue to be offered virtually.

3) Public Input

Steve Trujillo spoke about the success of the Bibliovan. He requested the creation of a women's soccer league, creation of an aviary at Ramsay Park, and creation of a tree planting program.

Eileen Clark-Nagaoka thanked staff for outreach efforts regarding the budget. She asked the City to fund a crisis intervention team to address mental health issues.

Anissa Balderas stated her disappointment in not seeing more funding for community services and parks programs, despite the public advocating for the City to do so. She asked the City to explore hiring social workers and emergency medical teams to address issues police were not equipped to handle.

Celeste stated the City had not done community outreach until the budget was almost final and did not take public input into consideration when finalizing the budget. She requested that the Police budget be reduced and used toward community development, parks programming, and low-income housing.

Juan Gomez requested that the City create an aviary in Watsonville. He asked Council to reduce the Police budget and use those funds for community programs.

Xitlali stated her concerns with the Police budget being so large. She asked the City to prioritize services for mental health crisis.

Eli asked Council to allocate money for community engagement and hiring of a social

media manager. Eli stated she had been advocating that Police funds should be reduced and used toward community programs.

Karina Moreno stated her concerns with the City Manager's Office's budget being so high. She asked the City to prioritize funding for the Library.

Yesenia Jimenez asked for additional funding for the Fire Department, reduction of the Police Department budget, creation of a team to address non-police emergency calls, maintain community access through virtual meetings, increase budget for Parks & Community Services, and increase the budget for the Library.

Positive Discipline asked Council to engage with the public on the budget prior to the draft budget being released. She asked the public to explore implementation of a Crisis Assistance Helping Out on the Streets (CAHOOTS) program.

Pam Sexton, teacher at Watsonville Adult School, asked Council to explore reduction of the Police Department budget. She asked Council to prioritize green infrastructure and explore implementation of a CAHOOTS program.

Gabriel Medina asked Members Estrada and Garcia to help rescind Measure Y by placing it back on the ballot. He asked Council to support the arts, reduce Police Department budget, and increase the budget for Parks & Community Services.

Edgar Ernesto Ibarra Gutierrez stated the community would work to repeal Measure Y. He asked Council to decrease the Police Department budget and increase the budget for Parks & Community Services.

Natalie Olivas, Regeneración: Pájaro Valley Climate Action, asked Council to reduce Police Department budget and increase funding to other departments to fully address the Council's Strategic Plan.

Lucila Sanchez, District 7, asked Council to decrease the Police Department budget and increase the budget for Parks & Community Services. She asked Council to prioritize American Rescue Plan Act funds for community and parks services.

Bernie Gomez stated Salinas had reduced its Police Department budget and asked Watsonville to do the same.

Frances Eliana asked Council to decrease the Police Department budget.

Daniel Dodge Jr. asked Council to support the Safe Streets Program Initiative. He thanked Assistant City Manager Vides for her work throughout the years.

Elias stated the budget did not reflect the needs of the community and Council should explore reduction of the Police Department budget.

Bacilio asked Council to decrease the Police Department budget.

Jessica Carrasco asked Council to prioritize the community's needs when approving the budget.

Cesar Lara asked Council to decrease the Police Department budget and increase the budget for Parks & Community Services.

Monike Tone asked Council to consider the homeless population living near the river when the Pájaro River Levee improvements are underway.

MOTION: It was moved by Member González and seconded by Member Montesino to introduce an uncodified ordinance increasing compensation by five percent (5%) for each member of the City Council from \$578.81 to \$607.75 per month.

Member Garcia stated she would be voting against Council compensation increases.

Mayor Dutra stated the City would explore responses to mental health emergencies, increasing traffic calming measures, supporting parks services, obtaining additional funding for capital improvement projects, and maintaining the City free from debris.

In answering Member García, City Manager Huffaker and City Attorney Smith spoke about process for repealing Measure Y.

In answering Member Gonzalez, City Manager Huffaker and Assistant City Clerk Ortiz spoke about repeal process for Measure Y, campaigning rules, and cost associated with repealing a measure.

INTRODUCTION OF UNCODIFIED ORDINANCE INCREASING COMPENSATION BY FIVE PERCENT (5%) FOR EACH MEMBER OF THE CITY COUNCIL PER MONTH INCLUDING A TERM LIFE INSURANCE POLICY IN THE AMOUNT OF \$50,000

In answering Member García, Administrative Services Director Czerwin stated that despite voting in opposition to the motion, all Council Members would receive the same benefits listed in the ordinance.
