# REGULAR MEETING OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF WATSONVILLE

In accordance with City policy, all Planning Commission meetings are recorded on audio and video in their entirety and are available for review in the Community Development Department (CDD). These minutes are a brief summary of action taken.

#### 1. ROLL CALL

Chair Veitch-Olson announced that Commissioner Cole notified her that she would be absent and recommended an excused absence for Commissioner Cole.

Chair Jenni Veitch-Olson, Vice-Chair Dorantes-Pulido and Commissioners Ed Acosta, Daniel Dodge (arrived at 6:27 p.m.), Anna Kammer, Lucy Rojas were present. Commissioner Cole was absent.

## 2) Planning Commission Clarifying & Technical Questions

In addressing Chair Veitch-Olson's concern about the possibility of bees in the sensory garden area of Ramsay Park, Park and Community Services Director Calubaquib replied they would do their best to minimize the number of plants.

Both Commissioners Kammer and Dorantes-Pulido complimented on the proposed design and layout of the park and how it can be used by all levels of physical abilities.

In answering Commissioner Dodge, Park and Community Services Director Calubaquib replied that to his knowledge there has not been an existing agreement with any of the baseball Little Leagues since the early 2000's. The City has worked with Watsonville American Little League for their use at Pinto Lake Park. The adult softball league operated by the City calls Ramsay Park their home and uses the baseball field 4 to 5 nights a week.

#### 5. PUBLIC HEARINGS

A. SPECIAL USE PERMIT WITH DESIGN REVIEW AND ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (APPLICATION NO. 627) FOR AN AUTOMATED CAR WASH FOR AN EXISTING GAS STATION WITH MINI-MART LOCATED AT 1455 FREEDOM BOULEVARD (APN: 016-061-06)

### 1) Staff Report

Staff report was given by Associate Planner Carmona.

### 2) Planning Commission Clarifying & Technical Questions

In answering Commissioner Dodge, Associate Planner Carmona stated the Special Use Permit (SUP) issued in 2013 was for an addition to the existing mini-mart. In 2014, a Special Use Permit with Design Review was approved

for the construction of a carwash. The applicant/property owner had two years to finalize the Planning Commission's approval with issuance of a building permit. No building permit was issued for the approved project and, therefore, the approval expired in 2016.

In answering Commissioner Kammer, Associate Planner Carmona replied the existing entrance off of Alta Vista will be closed off and since the project did not meet ADA requirements, they will be installing a handicap ramp off of Alta Vista, which will be up to code.

In answering Commissioner Acosta, Associate Planner Carmona replied only site plans with elevations were required to be submitted by the applicant. 3D renderings and isometric drawings are usually submitted for more elaborate development projects.

# 3) Applicant Presentation

Shashi Sharma, property owner gave his presentation. He thanked Associate Planner Carmona for his work and assistance. Mr. Sharma mentioned car washes are environmentally friendly since it only takes 20-25 gallons of water to wash one car compared to using 100 to 150 gallons of water to wash one car at home. He explained the reasons why he was not able to get the building permit in 2014.

# 4) Planning Commission Clarifying & Technical Questions

Commissioner Dodge thanked Mr. Sharma for his project and for the enhancements he is making to the business.

In answering Commissioner Dodge, Mr. Sharma replied the landscaping that is being installed was recommended by City staff.

In answering Commissioner Rojas, Associate Planner Carmona replied there is a designated area to vacuum the interior of your car and to put air in your tires.

In answering Commissioner Dodge, Associate Planner Carmona stated there is sufficient on-site parking for the business.
